PA-504 Montgomery County HUD Continuum of Care Grant Program FY23 New Project Intent To Apply Form

Funding Opportunity: The Montgomery County CoC seeks organizations interested in applying for new projects for possible inclusion in the HUD FY23 Continuum of Care Grant Competition. Last year, the CoC was eligible for up to \$608,146 in new bonus projects from HUD. The CoC is anticipating HUD to announce the funding amount it is eligible to apply for in the FY23 competition by the end of June 2023. Required: Organizations <u>must</u> submit a new project intent form by <u>June 9, 2023 at 11:59 PM EST</u> in order to be eligible for inclusion in the local Montgomery County CoC FY23 grant application for new projects. Organizations may submit intent forms for multiple projects, but must complete and submit a separate form for each. Organizations submitting Intent To Apply Forms will still be required to participate in the full CoC new project application process after HUD releases the FY23 Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO). The CoC's Governing Board will use this form submission to decide which projects to invite to submit a new project application in HUD e-snaps when the competition opens officially.

Eligible Organizations: Eligible project applicants for the CoC Program Competition include nonprofit organizations, states, local governments, instrumentalities of state and local governments, Indian Tribes and TDHE (as defined in section 4 of the Native American Housing Assistance and Self-Determination Act of 1996). Public housing agencies are eligible without limitation or exclusion. For-profit entities are ineligible to apply for grants or to be subrecipients of grant funds.

Eligible New Projects (subject to change upon the FY2023 NOFO release):

- 1. Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) is permanent housing in which housing assistance (e.g., long-term leasing or rental assistance) and supportive services are provided to assist households with at least one member (adult or child) with a disability in achieving housing stability.
- 2. Rapid Re-housing (RRH) is permanent housing that provides short-term (up to three months) and medium-term (4-24 months) tenant-based rental assistance and supportive services to households experiencing homelessness.
- 3. Joint Transitional Housing/Rapid Re-housing (Joint TH/RRH) combines two existing program components, Transitional Housing (TH) and RRH in a single project to serve individuals and families experiencing homelessness. They provide a safe place for people to stay crisis housing with financial assistance and wrap around supportive services determined by program participants to help them move to permanent housing as quickly as possible. Stays in the crisis housing portion of these projects should be brief and without preconditions, and participants should quickly move to permanent housing.
- 4. Dedicated HMIS project for the costs that can only be carried out by the HMIS

Lead, which is the Montgomery County Office of Housing and Community Development. Additionally, if the CoC has organizations within its geographic area that are victim service providers (VSPs), the HMIS Lead, or subrecipient, may request HMIS funds for a comparable database. VSPs may also request HMIS funds in their project application budgets to enter data into a comparable database.

- 5. Coordinated Entry projects to implement policies, procedures, and practices that equip the CoC's o better meet the needs of people experiencing homelessness who are survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking.
  - \* 1. The Montgomery County CoC is a partnership consisting of community residents, people with lived experience, and public, private, and nonprofit organizations whose shared purpose is to make the experience of homelessness rare, brief, and a one-time experience for all Montgomery County residents. The CoC complies with all of the responsibilities defined in the federal Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing Act (HEARTH Act) and the HUD Continuum of Care grant program. Membership in the Your Way Home Continuum of Care (CoC) is free and open to any person or organization committed to ending and preventing homelessness in Montgomery County, Pennsylvania. 6. For the FY2023 grant competition, the CoC is prioritizing new projects that help unsheltered families and individuals living on the street or other places not intended for human habitation exit to permanent housing with stability that leverage healthcare resources for program participants.

Sources of health care resources include:

- -Direct contributions from a public or private health insurance provider to the project (e.g., Medicaid), and
- -Provision of health care services by a private or public organization (e.g., Ryan White funded organization) tailored to the program participants of the project.

In the new project application process, the CoC will require applicants to demonstrate a written commitment between the project applicant and a health care organization that:

- (i) in the case of a substance abuse treatment or recovery provider, it will provide access to treatment or recovery services for all program participants who quality and choose those services; or
- (ii) the value of assistance being provided is at least an amount that is equivalent to 25 percent of the funding being requested for the project, which will be covered by the healthcare organization.

Acceptable forms of commitment are formal written agreements and must include the value of the commitment and dates the healthcare resources will be provided.

In-kind resources must be valued at the local rates consistent with the amount paid for services not supported by grant funds.
